COMMENTSpring Saints

The month of March sees the commemoration of several saints. The first of these is **Saint David (Dewi Sant)**, the patron saint of Wales, who is remembered on March 1.

According to tradition, David was born in Henfynyw in Ceredigion and was especially renowned for his teaching and as an inspiring preacher. He founded many monastic settlements in Wales and St David's Cathedral stands on the site of the monastery he founded in Pembrokeshire. His most well-known miracle is said to have taken place at the Synod of Brefi. As he was preaching, the ground on which he stood is said to have risen up to form a small hill and a white dove settled on his shoulder. The white dove subsequently became his emblem.

St Patrick

St Patrick was a fifth century Romano-British missionary in Ireland. Born in Britain, it is said that at the age of sixteen he was captured by Irish pirates and taken to Ireland. Here he was used as a slave looking after livestock, mainly sheep. He later wrote that this time was critical to his spiritual development, leading him to convert to Christianity. After six years he escaped and returned to his family but, after becoming a cleric, he returned to Ireland, baptising thousands of people, and ordaining priests to lead the new Christian communities.

Catherine of Siena

Catherine was a lay member of the Dominican Order, a mystic, activist and author. Born in March 1347 she is said to have had her first vision of Christ when she was about five. She decided at the age of seven and against the wishes of her parents, to devote herself to God. Later she joined the mantellate, a group of pious women, who devoted themselves to Dominican spirituality. She then travelled through northern and central Italy advocating reform of the clergy and advising people that repentance and renewal could be done 'through the total love of God.'

In 1377 she founded a women's monastery of strict observance outside Siena; she also became involved in politics and was instrumental in restoring the Papacy to Rome.

TEN SUGGESTIONS

A personal reworking of the Ten Commandments

During Lent I have been reflecting on the Ten Commandments seeking a deeper understanding of what they most truly convey in order to be better able to live in internal harmony with them, as suggested by Larry Warner in his book *Discovering the Spiritual Exercises of St Ignatius*. Here's what I have come up with:

	Exodus 20:2-17 (NRSV)	My Suggestion
1	You shall have no other gods before me	Turn your heart towards God whenever you find yourself turned away.
2	You shall not make for yourself an idol	Notice and be honest with yourself when anything starts to assume greater importance in your life than it really warrants.
3	You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the Lord your God.	Rather than claiming to speak for God, own what you say and speak from your own experience with honesty and humility.
4	Remember the Sabbath day and keep it holy.	Recognise your need for rest and take time to reflect on your week and savour the good things in it.
5	Honour your father and your mother.	Appreciate the positives you received from your parents, forgive their mistakes and inadequacies, and take care of them with kindness when they need your help.
6	You shall not murder.	In all your relationships try to bring out the best in the other person.
7	You shall not commit adultery.	Try to co-create a lifelong mutually fulfilling relationship where you each help the other to become fully alive.
8	You shall not steal.	Be generous in giving what you have and only take what is offered to you openly and with love.
9	You shall not bear false witness against your neighbour.	Seek for truth without distortion in everything you think, say and do.
10	You shall not covet your neighbour's house or anything that belongs to your neighbour.	Be happy for others when they have good things, share their joy without seeking to possess them for yourself.

Friends of St Anne's no longer able to pack and send goods to the hospital

In October 2020 Friends of St Anne's Hospital lost their packing centre, as the site is to be re-developed. Before leaving they managed to pack 56 parcels of aid and transport them to the docks for shipment to the hospital.

But their volunteer workforce, many of them of advancing years, need a break and a new base would be needed, so the supply of goods to the hospital has been suspended. "A massive thank you to the packing team", writes lady chairman, Judith James, "and their long-suffering families for the extreme effort to clear the centre and pack everything ready for the container. Many thanks, too, to the hospitals and medical establishments who have

kindly donated medical equipment, which is greatly appreciated at St Anne's Hospital.

But the Friends are continuing to support the hospital. As mentioned last month they have completed the work on the external plumbing. "We are now moving," writes Judith, "to the internal work, starting with the outpatients' department. There are still many projects needing help (funds permitting, such as internal plumbing for the wards."

Liuli has not been badly affected by Covid, due to the remoteness of the area but adds Judith, "hospital staff are extremely worried about the [omicron] variant in case it spreads further north."




