Welcome to Katherine Hyde, our new Licensed Lay Minister By Roland Gillott

Katherine Hyde, who has been with us at St Michael's since the end of August, was licensed as a Licensed Lay Minister (LLM) at a Licensing Service at Christ Church Cathedral, Oxford on Saturday 4 November, 2023. The service was led by the Bishop of Dorchester, the Rt Revd. Gavin Collins. Katherine was presented to Bishop Gavin by Archdeaconry Advi-

sor Peter Flory, and supported for the Parish, on behalf of Revd. Debbie, by Fr. Peter Binns. Katherine was also supported at the service by Robin, her husband, by her immediate and wider families and by friends.

The following day, All Souls Day, Katherine preached at both the 8:30am and the 10am Eucharists, and there was a drinks celebration for her after the latter service.

Before her licensing, Revd. Debbie agreed with Katherine that she would not be involved in St. Michael's work on Mondays and Wednesdays, so please leave her in peace on those days. Potentially a good time to catch her around St Michael's may be on Tuesday mornings, and she has taken on *A Crafty Cuppa* on the second and fourth Fridays of each month, which she is very much enjoying.

Katherine will also be leading the Advent Course (based on the book: *Stick with Love* by Arun Arora) on Zoom on Tuesday evenings: 28 November, 5 December and 12 December. Details of how to access the course are available from the Church Office.



Wycombe Homeless Connection WYCOMBE

Wycombe Homeless Connection's vision is to see South Buckinghamshire transformed into a place where no one is homeless and that there is suitable housing and housing security for all – because we believe that is what God wants for our community.

We believe that every single person who is homeless, or in fear of losing their home, has worth, is loved by God, and should be given help and hope and a home, no matter what their situation.

Our first winter night shelter opened in Wycombe in 2008, and immediately people who were sleeping rough had a safe, warm place to stay and could be helped to find a home for good. Since then we have opened a support centre in the town, started a homelessness prevention service and in the last few years, including during the pandemic, we have stretched across the county to areas where we are needed most. Our homelessness help drop-in in Chesham has been running since 2019 and one in six of the people we help come from the town.

We serve people like Tony, who came to our door cold and hungry, having slept on the streets for a number of nights.

Struggling with his mental health and addiction, he had been sleeping on the sofa at a family member's house, but relations had broken down and he was left with no choice but to leave. He didn't know what to do or who to turn to, but a local resident who saw him sleeping rough suggested he

come to our door.

Within minutes of arriving, Tony was given hot food and warm clothes. We organised emergency accommodation so he was safe that night.

We then began working with him to find longer term solutions. We helped Tony register with a GP and access other support including regular parcels from a local foodbank; we connected him to local addiction support services and helped him apply for the benefits he was entitled to.

Tony's story isn't over yet, and whatever it takes we want our door to be open to more people like Tony this winter.

How do we do this? Only with the support, prayers and help of God and our community.

We provide a range of free services, to help people who are homeless as well as to help people avoid homelessness, including emergency accommodation.

Our support centre and homelessness helpline is open every weekday so people can get wide ranging help and advice. We provide additional accommodation in the winter and drop-in sessions where people can get food, a shower, laundry and companionship and hope.

At our housing legal advice clinic people facing a housing crisis can get specialist support to avoid illegal and unfair eviction and assistance to negotiate with their landlords and housing providers. We help people fight unfair and illegal evictions, to talk with their landlords and housing providers and we help people understand their rights, and can accompany them to court. In fact just last week we helped six people at court hearings and all six cases were decided in favour of our clients – everyone

got to stay in their home or were given breathing room to find a better option than being made homeless!

How can your fellowship help people who are homeless or facing homelessness in Amersham?

Pray: Please pray for the people we serve, our staff and volunteers and that God continues to bless us with the resources we need to do God's work. Please pray for Tony and the hundreds of people who we meet or come to us every year for help to find and keep a home.

Tell: We would love for you to tell people we are here for them if they are in a housing crisis. Word of mouth, personal connection, is by far the most effective way of making sure people know what we do and through your ministries we are sure you will know and meet people who could benefit from our help.

Sleepout: Our Big Sleepout will be on Saturday 2rd March 2024 and we need people to join us at Adams Park football stadium, in Wycombe, to sleepout 'at home' or host their own mini-Sleepout at a Guide or Scout hut, at church, in the school or work playground or somewhere similar. Not only will you raise much needed money but you will act in solidarity with the people we serve. You can find out more on our website.

Once upon a time, a young student fresh out of Montessori training joined sure the learning materials were beauthat will forever stay in her heart. a small Montessori childcare centre in St. Michael's Church Hall, Amersham. As an eighteen-year-old, she was terrified of not meeting the expectations of this school, called the Beehive, which was run by an amazing lady called Lyndsey Nelson. From day one, she noticed that children were treated in nature, way before this was even with warmth and respect as they came into the school, shaking a teacher's hand and saying, "good morning!" Children then came into the school and were given the freedom of choice to choose their own learning. It felt peaceful and calm and I don't think parents really knew the amount of work that went into setting that space up every day, and ensuring teachers were ready and prepared to provide the best of themselves every day.

Lyndsey worked tirelessly to make tiful, well presented and always exciting. Whenever she went anywhere, she bought things for the children and the centre. She had this fundamental belief that children are wonderful, curious learners and a regular part of the curriculum was going out for walks popular.

As you can imagine, this young teacher was in awe of Lyndsey. She was allowed to grow and develop and explore her teaching. Every day was filled with laughter, fun and enjoyment. Lyndsey knew her staff well, and had a wonderful sense of humour, bringing out the best in each of them. By the time this young person left the Beehive, not only was she a better teacher, but she'd also developed a

rich friendship with an incredible lady




