JOACHIM & ANNE By Edmond Eiliazadeh

As a Christian community, we follow our faith through Jesus by reading the Bible and more or less practising what Jesus has asked us to do. It is so heart warming and significant to see how this book of revelation has become compatible with today's modern time. We speak of Jesus and his commandments and also of the disciples, their work, and our duty in that respect, but we don't know much about their background and their personal philosophy of religion and how they became believers and followers of Jesus. We are quite familiar with the Holy Ghost descending upon the Virgin Mary and the miraculous pregnancy, while she was not married but engaged to Joseph according to Jewish law.

So who were Mary and Joseph? Let's focus on Mary for the moment. Mary was a young girl from the small town of Nazareth. She grew up in a moderately wealthy family. Her father, Joachim, was known as a generous, wealthy man, pronounced for his work and regular giving to the poor. It is not confirmed but his wealth is thought to come partly from ownership of a large herd and flock.

It has been said that once, at the temple, his sacrifice was rejected as the

couple's childlessness was interpreted as a sign of divine displeasure; consequently, Joachim was very upset and disappointed and he withdrew to the desert, where he fasted and did penance for forty days. It has been revealed that angels appeared to both Joachim and Anne individually to promise them a child. Joachim later returned to Jerusalem and embraced Anne at the



city gate, located in the walls of Jerusalem.

An ancient belief held that a child, born of an elderly mother who has given up hope of having offspring, was destined for great things.

Joachim was born in Nazareth, c75 B.C. in Hasmonean Judaea and died in Jerusalem c15 B.C. in the Herodian kingdom of Judaea. We do not know much about St. Anne, mother of the Virgin Mary. Her story has been told in a document known as 'The Gospel of James'. Whether the names and dates in this gospel are correct or not is unimportant, for instead we should look to the truth that we do know, and she is mostly appraised for giving birth to



the Virgin Mary and raising her worthy of the glory of God.

This year, the Church of England celebrates Anne and Joachim on Wednesday, 26 July.

HOME COMMUNION By Ann Jarvis.

When Alan Crawley, a Curate at St. Michael's, left to join another Parish, I took over creating the rota for Home Communions. I continued to do this until just before the COVID pandemic.

The rota was not only for members of the Church but also included the care homes, Pratt House, Mansil House and the Croft. It involved the Clergy and a small but dedicated team from the congregation.

I became very aware of how much these visits were appreciated whether it was for a short time while a member of the Church recovered from an illness or for the rest of the person's life. The continued contact with St. Michael's was deeply treasured.

The visits to the care homes also extended the outreach of St. Michael's beyond the congregation, which is an objective we, as a Church, are very keen to continue. On many occasions we were thanked by the residents' families, indicating how much the resident had appreciated receiving communion. In some cases a family member would ask if they too could join the short service, something they could share with their relative.

At this time little did I realise that I too would be a recipient of Home Communion. Following a

heart attack on New Years Eve, 2022, I found I was being asked whether I would like communion brought to me. My initial reaction was, I regret to say, "please leave me in peace". However, it quickly occurred to me that attending a full service at Church, even a short Tuesday service, was far too daunting an experience to contemplate. So, for several weeks Revd. Debbie and Fr. Peter took it in turns to visit me on a Thursday morning.

It was just what I needed, keeping me in touch with God not only through my own prayers, but using the incredibly comforting communion prayers which had been such a constant throughout my life.

The response, "Lord I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word and I shall be healed", can mean so much in lots of different ways, depending on where you are in life and what your particular needs are at that time.

Home Communion is one of the many almost unnoticed activities happening at St. Michael's but, as is often the case in life, it is of immeasurable importance.

I can vouch for that!

When Keith and I and our son, David, moved to Amersham, nearly 51 years ago, we joined the congregation at St. Michael's. I had been arranging flowers at our village church for several years and wondered if I could be of any help in our new parish. After attending for three weeks, I enquired if there was anything I could do. The rest is history, I have been arranging flowers at St. Michael's ever since.

From weekly arrangements to festivals, and yes, even weddings, it has always been a combined effort to keep our flower arrangements special.

It mostly involves each of us doing a pedestal arrangement once or twice a year and joint efforts for festivals.

St. Michael's is an interesting church in which to arrange flowers compared with older, darker, churches. We have to be careful to consider the glass screen behind the altar and the fact that the back of the pedestal can be seen from the Lady Chapel!

Now we have a problem making fresh flower arrangements every week due to a shortage of volunteers. We have sadly lost several valued volunteers in the last year or two.

I have made three silk flower arrangements which we use as an alternative but it would be good to have fresh flowers more often if possible. Pedestals and oasis are available in the flower cupboard.

It is such a lovely thing to do and I know that it gives pleasure to many who comment.

SO, are there any willing volunteers out there? You don't have to be an expert, just have an eye for beauty and an interest in flowers. You will be very welcome and we can help with tips!

THE BEEHIVE MONTESSORI SCHOOL

in St. Michael's Hall By Lyndsey Nelson



I opened the Beehive Montessori School back in 1990 and moved to St. Michael's Church Hall in 2000.

Our Nursery runs five mornings a week, from 9.15am -12.15pm, and one afternoon session (or more if parents are interested in this option) till 2.45pm.

We take children from 2yrs – 5yrs.

A Forest School session also takes place on a Thursday at local woods.

I've been so fortunate to have witnessed so many children's growth assisted by a wonderful approach where the child is truly at the centre of everything we do.

I always find it quite challenging to explain Montessori in a nutshell as my passion for this subject takes over!!!

Here's a little insight!!

Montessori is an educational approach developed by Dr. Maria Montessori, an Italian physician and educator at the turn of the 1900s. It focuses on helping children learn and grow in a supportive and hands-on environment.



Child-Centred Learning:

Montessori believes that children are naturally curious and capable of learning on their own. In Montessori classrooms, children have the freedom to choose their activities and work at their own pace, following their interests and abilities.



Prepared Environment:

Montessori classrooms are carefully designed to provide a range of learning materials and activities that are accessible to children. Everything in the environment is child-sized and arranged in an organized manner, allowing children to independently explore and engage with the materials.

Respect for Individual Development: Montessori recognizes that each child develops at their own pace and has unique strengths

and interests. Teachers in Montessori classrooms observe and understand each child's individual needs, providing tailored guidance and support to foster their growth and development.



Hands-On Learning:

Montessori emphasizes learning through hands-on experiences. Children work with specially designed materials that encourage sensory exploration, problemsolving, and critical thinking. These materials are self-correcting, meaning children can identify and correct their mistakes independently.



Mixed-Age Classes:

Montessori classrooms often have mixed-age groups, typically spanning three-year age ranges. This setup allows younger children to learn from older ones and older children to reinforce their knowledge by helping younger ones. It fosters a sense of community and encourages co-operation and empathy.



Focus on Independence and

Life Skills: Montessori encourages children to be-

come independent learners and develop life skills. They learn to take care of themselves and their environment, such as tidying up, pouring drinks or dressing themselves. These practical life activities foster independence, responsibility, and self-confidence.

Individualized Pace: Children are allowed to learn at their own pace without feeling rushed or

pressured. They

can spend as much time as they need on a particular activity or concept, ensuring they fully grasp and internalise the knowledge.

The curriculum includes all of the following - Practical Life, Grace and Courtesy, Sensorial, Literacy, Art, Music, Geography, History, Natural Sciences, Mathematics, outdoor play and more!

It is so rewarding to watch the children's development over time and it never ceases to amaze me how much children can learn at this age. Their brains are like sponges. That's why it is such an important period in their lives.

We aim to ignite the passion for learning and help them on their path to independence, foster self-confidence, respect for one another and provide them with loving adults who can support them on this wonderful journey.



Who passed away suddenly but peacefully on 6 June 2023.




