The Servant Queen and the King She Serves

The first British monarch to reign for 70 years is shortly to celebrate her Platinum Jubilee. She has been one of the few constant aspects of life in this country for all these years. Her coronation was a very memorable televised event, with a large number of people watching or buying a television for the first time. Celebrities and politicians come and go but she has remained, calm and steadfast.

A statement, on her 21st birthday, set the tone for the life she intended: *I declare* before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong. ... God help me to make good my vow, and God bless all of you who are willing to share in it. What a statement for a 21 year old to make! How many of us have been able to stay true to something we promised at that age?

In 2016, to celebrate her 90th birthday, a book called **The Servant Queen and the King She Serves** was published. This lovely book covers many aspects of her life history, her character and interests – and a main theme is her constant sense of duty and her devotion to God which is often referred to in her Christmas broadcasts.

I know just how much I rely on my faith to guide me through the good times and the bad. Each day is a new beginning. I know that the only way to live my life is to try to do what is right, to take the long view, to give of my best in all that the day brings and to put my trust in God. I draw strength from the message of hope in the Christian gospel. (2002).

Over the past few years, along with her subjects, she has indeed experienced 'good' and 'bad' times but has personally remained a steady and inspirational figure.

In June 2022 many of us will be thanking God for this remarkable woman, our servant Queen, and the privilege of living during her reign.

Christian Aid Week May 15—May 21

The story of just one family suffering the effects of climate change

Jessica Mwedzi smiles with love for her children as she stirs a single bowl of porridge for them. But she knows they're hungry for more. This one bowl of porridge is all she and her family can eat today: "My children crave a decent meal, but I can't provide. We often go to bed on an empty stomach. It pains me to send them to bed hungry."

Women are at the mercy of climate change and hunger. For Jessica, drought means every day is a struggle for survival.

Like many women in rural Zimbabwe - 7 out of 10 rely on farming for income and food - she toils on her farm, but nothing can grow on ashen, dry land.

The Week is the major fundraising event of the year for Christian Aid. And as climate change strikes even harder in Africa the work of Christian is more important than ever

Drought starves. Intensified by the climate crisis, and the effects of war in Ukraine on global food production, it drives families into hunger. Jessica recalls that "One year, we had no rain. The scorching sun burnt my crops just as they were about to bloom. It was so painful and disheartening."

Update on Traidcraft Support of the Food Bank

The need remains great and growing; your continuing support is humbling and amazing and the economic challenges keep rolling down the track. We have achieved a milestone. In the 25 months since we began on this challenging pathway people have donated collectively £50,000, which we have spent buying ethically-sourced and fairly-traded qual-

ity goods requested by, and delivered to, the Food Bank. The original challenge around the first covid lockdown was superseded by the second and third, and then new cost of living challenges driven by rising costs, inflation-beating fuel price rises and the consequences of the terrible tragedy unfolding in Ukraine for

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food and fuel prices, Throughout all of these challenges your generous support has been fundamental in enabling those in most need to be given a helping hand, and again demonstrating the value of our service, allowing the food bank to provide a balanced range of goods in support of their clients. Margorie Redpath Retires from Missionary Giving Group

Marjorie Redpath was one of the founding members of the group that recommends to PCC the charities that the Church should support. And it was she, along with then vicar Brian Griffiths, who encouraged the PCC to see missionary giving as a primary commitment., In other words it should not be a matter of deciding each year what we could afford to give but committing to giving a fixed percentage of the previous year's voluntary income—10% to Christian charities working overseas and 5% to charities working in the UK. That policy has been faithfully followed until

the significant drop in our income as a result of the pandemic, forced PCC reluctantly to suspend it for the past couple of years.

Marjorie chaired the group with dedication and efficiency, maintaining close links with the beneficiaries, for more years than she cares to remember. She eventually handed over to Joy Tobler and the group is now chaired by Andy Connor, but she has remained an active participant right down to the present.

It was Marjorie who persuaded USPG (as it then was) to

allocate our contribution to specific pieces of work that we could relate to and it was that that brought us the continuing link with Friends of St Anne's Hospital in Liuli, Tanzania. Marjorie became a good friend of the Rev Dr Sam Ndimbo, then the senior (indeed only) doctor at the hospital. She organised Sam's several visits to St Michael's and remains in touch with him by phone to this day. She served for several vears as a Trustee of Friends of St Anne's.

Jo Harrington says "Perhaps a formidable person (in the French sense) would be a suitable tribute." And she adds: "So modest, focused totally on any job in hand, and a darn good car driver, too!"
